## Branson: Never Run Out of Things to do

Plethora - (noun) meaning excess or over abundance and could be used to describe attractions in Branson, Missouri - site of our 2019 reunion.

All in a nice way of course.

A year or so after our last time in Branson (2005), the Titanic Museum was constructed - one the editor really wanted to see - maybe this time.

Staircase, which have been carefully reproduced as they were on the Titanic.

The Titanic Museum Branson vividly recounts the story of the famous ship with exhibits that feature more than 400 artifacts that belonged to the ship and its passengers.

You can also touch a real iceberg, stand on sloping decks that replicate the Titanic's final

moments, and more for the fee of \$28.50.

Included in the exhibits: a room where you can touch an authentic iceberg and experience the chill of the icy waters where the Titanic sank. Walk along decks that slope at the same angle as the decks when the ship went down.

After making your own way to the Titanic Museum Branson, simply exchange your voucher at the box office for your admission ticket. The ticket comes in the form of a boarding pass, which you use to begin your self-guided tour.

With your boarding pass, you'll receive a brief biography of one of the Titanic's passengers or crew members, with details about their lives and time aboard the Titanic.

Step aboard a detailed replica of the Titanic with your admission ticket to the Titanic Museum Branson in Missouri. During your self-guided tour, see hallways, cabins, parlors and the Grand

Some fun things to see include:



On Feb. 16 the USS Tulsa (LCS 16) - an Independence-class Littoral combat ship designed to patrol coastlines - was commissioned in San Francisco, Calif.

The event was shown on television and streamed at the local American Legion post. All the local news stations captured the commissioning and following it interviewed veterans who had gathered to watch.

I was one of the lucky ones - identified as the Sumner Sentinel editor.

At the Legion Post 1 Hayden talked about attending navy reunions and queried "How many of us sailors that go to these things have ships named after our city?" Not that many. So I like that; it's great."

Hayden served in the Navy for four years - from 1960 to 1964. The last time Tulsa had a namesake ship was nearly two decades before his service - in 1946.

He watched the ceremony alongside fellow veterans and their families, eyes locked on the screen. He mouthed the words to Anchors Aweigh and The Star Spangled Banner, and got emotional when reflecting on the events of the day.

"Sometimes when they play The Star Spangled Banner at a football game, that's just okay," Hayden said. "But when they do it in this kind of setting, I get overcome. It just brings a tear."

The ceremony itself lasted about an hour. Watching the new ship being boarded by her crew reminded Hayden of his Navy days, and he wishes the best to those sailors with all new adventures ahead of them.

"There will be some challenges, and there will be some thrilling days," Hayden said, "

but I wish them well, and I hope they stay under God's cloak, and nothing bad befalls them."

Speakers at the ceremony reflected on Tulsa's history and its place in the U.S.

At the end of your tour, you'll enter the Memorial Room and

discover the fate of your assigned person.

Upon entering, you'll gain insights into the size and scale of the original ship. The Branson version is ½ scale. Walk through multiple exhibit rooms in cabins, hallways and parlors to learn about the ship and its passengers.

Admire the grand staircase, valued at one million dollars, which has been meticulously recreated aboard this model ship. Third-class cabins, first-class suites and other areas have been built to original scale.

Visitors may spend as much time as desired at the museum, gaining insight into one of the most famous shipwrecks of recent history.



A mere 45 miles north of the hotel is the Wonders of Wildlife Museum Located next to Bass Pro Shops National Headquarters in Springfield, Missouri the campus is a centerpiece of America's Conservation Capital in Missouri's Ozark Mountains.

Created by noted conservationist and Bass Pro Shops founder/CEO Johnny Morris, the 350,000-square-foot experience celebrates those who hunt, fish, and act as stewards of the land and water.
