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Aircraft Carrier Shokaku no match for Cavalla

Another attraction for Allen M. Sumner to visit will be Seawolf Parkand the Galveston Naval Museum home of the USS Cavalla, SS-244 (later SSK-244 and AGSS-244.)

According to the According the Historic Naval Ships Association, USS Cavalla was called "The Luckiest Ship in the Submarine Service" because of her outstanding performance during her short time in service before the end of World War II.

She logged 90,000 miles, made 570 dives, and

sank 34,180 tons of Japanese shipping.

Her greatest sinking, during six war patrols, was the aircraft carrier Shokaku that had participated in the attack on Pearl Harbor.

Additionally, she was present in Tokyo Bay in September 1945 for the surrender signing aboard Missouri.

A Gato Class submarine, Cavalla (named for a saltwater fish) was decommissioned in 1946 and returned to service in 1951 to be converted to a hunter-killer submarine (SSK).

She was assigned the experimental designation AGSS in 1963.

She was transferred to the U.S. Submarine Veterans of World War II in early 1971, and delivered to her permanent berth later that year. She serves as a memorial to submariners lost in World War II.

USS Cavalla is a National Historic Landmark. Armed with 10 21-inch torpedo tubes, one

4-inch/50 caliber gun; one 40 mm gun.

Cavalla had a maximum speed of 21 knots surfaced and 9 knots submerged; a cruising range of 11,000 miles. Her fuel capacity was 94,400 gallons of Diesel and a patrol endurance of 75 days.



Business End of the Cavalla - Originally six 21-inch torpedo tubes were housed here with space for 14 berths. Extra "fish" were stored on racks annud under floor plates.
